



The London Youth Games Cross Country marked the opening of the 2019 London Youth Games season and is where all 32 London Boroughs took part in a short run on Parliament Hill.

On a crisp, autumn morning, I set off early by train to the iconic North London venue to run as part of a team of ten girls in the under 15 team, representing Croydon.

Compared to previous years, although it was still very cold, weather conditions were good and were a lot less muddy. Which element is a solid at room temperature, yet would melt in the palm of your hand?



### **BFI German Film Day**



Last Thursday, a group of Sixth Form students together with two from Year 11 went on a trip to the BFI cinema in London, where we were given a fascinating introduction to German cinema.

We had the opportunity to watch several clips, which were followed by a discussion of how cinematic techniques have evolved. We watched a variety of screenings and explored how the "Filmanfang" (film opening) set the mood, look, style and feeling of the film. We watched a "Propagandanfilm" called "Hitlerjugend" and we were shown the reaction of the German people at mass rallies with people applauding in celebration of their leader. We got the feeling that we were part of the crowd because of the noise.

We thought of adjectives associated with this screening and we came up with adjectives such as "patriotisch" (patriotic), "laut" (loud) and "gefährlich" (dangerous). The director decided to incorporate a lot of close ups which made us feel as though we were part of this unrealistic world. Additionally, it was really interesting to see the parallels between "Hitlerjugend" and "Die Welle" (the wave).

The wave is about a teacher who tried an experiment on the class. He conveyed how easily a group of people could be indoctrinated by ideologies and how a dictatorship could be possible once again. We also reviewed equally intriguing screenings of "Lola rennt" and "Die Fetten Jahre sind vorbei" - commonly known as the educators.

At 1:30 we saw the full movie of "Das Leben der Anderen" which provided us with an unromanticised version of East Germany being under the control of the Stasi and spying on this artist. It was a truly compelling experience and I learned lots of wonderful new vocabulary and expressions, which I can now put into practice.

## PoD Black And White Using Light



On Thursday 6th December, several Year 9 students were given the opportunity to explore the use of light in photography in the art studio darkroom, during Mrs Broad's PoD on light and dark.

We were able to develop our own photos with the use of chemicals and an enlarger to create an image that depicted darker objects as lighter and vice versa. We learnt a lot of useful information about the use of light in art, and how only a few seconds of light exposure is sufficient to develop an image using the enlarger. We also discovered how chemistry is a key aspect when developing a photo in the darkroom, due to the use of many chemicals which allow an image to fully develop.

To summarise, it was a very informative PoD which allowed students to be interactive and try out newly learnt skills for themselves and to see how art can be formed in a wide variety of ways.

#### The Ash Girl

The Drama Department's production of *The Ash Girl* proved a great success. The play is a modern, feminist retelling of the classic Cinderella story. In this version, the Seven Deadly Sins manipulate the main characters and control their actions. Ashgirl must resist temptation and learn to find hope in the darkness.

The production was filled with fantastic performances and spectacular costumes, which were designed by Kate O (Year 10). Audiences were very impressed by their quality and creativity. Disha (Year 12) was a sympathetic Ashgirl. Bethany (Year 10), Nicole (Year 11) and Molly (Year 12) proved wickedly funny as the Stepmother and sisters.

Other standout performances included Madinah (Year 9) as Sadness and Ellen, Ashvini, Aneesa, Amy-Janet (Year 11), Vy, Ashyre-Mae (Year 10) and Damola (Whitgift School - Year 10) as the Seven Deadly Sins. Sumaiya and Rhian (Year 7) were charming as the Otter and Owl. Shazia (Year 6) and Omolara (Year 7) stole the audience's hearts as Ashgirl's lovable mice friends.

Finally, the sin ensemble proved absolutely frightening and their use of choral speaking and movement demonstrated their outstanding skills as actors. All the other performers were outstanding and there were some especially moving and exciting performances in this production.
