

Old Palace Team Reaches Grand Final



The crème de la crème of the 10 best Years 12-13 teams in Great Britain reach French debating grand final at the French Institute.

This year again, the Francophonie UK group (which includes the representations of France, Canada, Switzerland, Monaco, Belgium, and Quebec in the UK) placed the 10 best schools in the spotlight by organising a grand debating competition for British pupils in Years 12 and 13 learning French in secondary schools in the country.

These debates are very impressive in terms of eloquence and the high quality of exchanges and only the best debating teams in the country are selected. First of all, the jury panel, which featured the Swiss Ambassador, the Canadian First Consul and the French Cultural Attaché, members of diplomatic missions of French-speaking countries, and representatives of educational circles, warmly welcomed and congratulated the students as they came first out of the 10 teams in the preliminary round to qualify for the grand final.

Urwah and Yasmin qualified to take part in these exceptional competitions which included other selected schools: Perse, Eton, King's Wimbledon, All Saints, Haberdashers' Askes's, Cheltenham, Hills Road, Alleyn's and Saint Paul's Girl School.

Once again, The Old Palace School students exhibited their flair for discussing topics in French by tackling topics such as 'We must continue to develop nuclear energy,' (Cannabis should be legalised' and 'The concept of national identity is obsolete'. They worked extremely well together and really complemented each other's debating style – strong yet courteous, statistical yet passionate.

They were congratulated for the quality of their arguments and their spoken French. Bravo, chères demoiselles! Sincères félicitations!

The It's a Fish Out competition this year was again fiercely contested by boys and girls schools from all over Surrey. Twenty four teams in total took part in three hours of intense competition. Eight activity stations are located around the pool, with two much needed rest stations between each of them.

The stations consist of practices such as rope coiling and throwing to perform rescues, and an underwater basket relay, both mentioned by Natalie. There was a very difficult feet-first sculling event, a throwing rescue where a ball is thrown to a casualty, a questions and answers station on all types of water safety including swimming pools, coastal, rivers, canals, locks and weirs. There was also a brick retrieval station that required each team member to head first (surface dive) for a heavy brick and take it to the surface, as a continual relay. In this event Sara, Zainab, Beatrice and Alyssa did extremely well finishing with 32, the highest score of all twenty four teams competing!

The remaining events were a continuous head-up relay and a straddle entry station; the latter of which consisted of a step-in entry to the water from full height, creating as much surface area as possible to stop your head and shoulders going into the water. All the girls performed magnificently and I am sure slept very well that night. I was exhausted from just going around the poolside with the teams! GCSE Dance Performance Exam

On Wednesday 20th of March, Year 11 Dance GCSE students performed two solo set phrases and a duet for 30% of our final Dance GCSE grade. This is combined with the Choreography element, which was previously examined, to form the practical element of our grade.

The first set phrase 'Breathe' explored the concept of inhalation and exhalation, whilst the second set phrase 'Flux' displayed the notion of off-balance. We have been preparing for this exam since the beginning of Year 10, developing our physical, technical and mental skills. The duets were based on the stimulus of beneath the surface of emotions. This was inspired by Infra which is one of the set works. Overall, we enjoyed this experience and will use some of the transferable skills in our future careers.

However, we ended the tournament on a high with victories against Shirley and Norbury Manor - allowing us to finish 3rd overall.



The UKMT Group Maths Challenge

On Tuesday 19th March, four students from Years 8-9 went to Pimlico Academy to compete in the UKMT Group Maths Challenge, against over 25 other schools.

There were four tasks that we had to do: the group questions, cross-number, shuttle and relay. In the group challenge Anna 9L, Catherina 8L, Clarissa 8H, and myself answered ten difficult questions as a group in 45 minutes. The questions were especially hard this year but we completed all of them within the time set. This was our most successful round as we worked together methodically as a team. After this challenge we were even told that we were in the Top Ten schools at this point.

Next, we had the cross-number, where we split off into partners (half doing the down questions and half answering the across). We answered questions that had seemed impossible at one point, which then really boosted our own confidence. Then we had lunch, which gave us time to relax and talk about strategies. After the break, we had the shuttle task, where we answered questions and passed them on to the other pair within the eight minutes set per section. The last questions were incredibly difficult, but we carried on and completed this too.

Last but not least was the relay task. We were running around the hall, answering questions and handing papers in a flurry, but we continued to strive no matter what lay ahead of us. In the end, we came 9th; a considerable achievement

bearing in mind that we had been against some of the top schools in the country including Westminster School.

We have learnt that no matter what we should always carry on and do our best. All our hard work throughout the term had paid off. I thoroughly enjoyed partaking in the Maths Challenge and wish all the best to those partaking in next year's competition.
