GCSE Results 2019

Students have excelled in the new numerical GCSE grades this summer, with 76% achieving the top grades of 9 - 7. Overall, 99% of grades were 9 - 5.

Top performing subjects include Latin and Religious Studies (one of this year's most popular subjects nationally): Maths, English and History.

Meanwhile, 93% of GCSE subjects still using A*-E were graded B+.

Changes to Nursery

From September we are making some positive changes to the room structures at Old Palace. The changes are being made to reflect the developmental needs of the children in our care.

The Transition group, like the Pre School group, will become a school year. Therefore children aged 2 years on 1st September will join the Transition Group in September and remain in Transition for the full academic year. This will provide a stable environment at this important developmental stage, whereby the children will have the same learning environment, same peers, and same key person for the entire year before they move on to Pre School, instead of the previous system where we moved them up on their birthdays.

The Toddler room will now be named the Baby room, and the age group will be approximately 12 to 18 months. I will inform parents when I feel it is the best time for your child to move to the next room, Toddlers. The Toddler room will cater for children aged approximately 18 months and they will remain in that room until the September when they at 2 year's old.

Primary Engineer and Hitachi Celebration Event

On Monday 8th July, four girls from Preparatory, Amber, Abinesha, Isobel and Sariah, attended the Primary Engineer Hitachi Rail Celebration event with Mrs Wallis at the IET, Institute of Engineering and Technology, in London.

All of the Year 5 girls had been working in pairs during DT lessons on making a wheeled locomotive powered by a motor and two batteries. Mrs Wallis then had the very difficult task of selecting only two teams to take part in the Celebration event.

The Celebration Day was a chance for the two teams to test their locomotives and discuss their design and making process with the judges. The testing involved attaching their locomotive to two wagons and trying to pull the maximum weight over a distance of three metres and testing to see if the locomotive could travel forwards and backwards in a straight line.

The girls were questioned by two different panels of judges and had to present their portfolio for the project and answer questions about their design, discussing any problems they came up against and how they solved them.



It was a long day, with a break for lunch, but the girls had fun testing their designs and seeing all of the other locomotives from lots of other schools.

At the end of the event, Amber and Abinesha were thrilled to discover that they had won the award for the best design! The girls were presented with a medal and special edition Hitachi Monopoly game by Karen Boswell O.B.E Managing Director of Hitachi Rail Ltd.


UCL Summer School

During the summer holidays, we attended the UCL Summer School on Homer. This consisted of a week of fascinating lectures discussing the Iliad and the Odyssey and their reception by Renaissance authors and artists. A whole range of people attended (from classics students to English teachers!) which allowed for enthusiastic discussion and debate.

The lectures detailed the rich variety of themes in the epics, including the way that the Gods are portrayed and the concept of heroism in the ancient world. We also had the opportunity to attend extra lectures after the day; particularly interesting topics were the treatment of disabled people in Ancient Greece, (not outcast but instead a part of the community) the aspects of negotiation and bargaining in the Iliad and the use of animals at the time (not as fond pets, but rather as currency).

Thanks to our lecturer's wonderful knowledge of the Renaissance period, we were able to discuss the way that these heroes were portrayed; Odysseus, often thought of as a brave and enduring hero, is instead tortured in Dante's inferno as a result of the contemporary attitude of Christians towards lying and deceit. We ended the week with a wonderful party.

Russell Hepplewhite is widely known for his operatic, musical theatre and choral music including his ground-breaking operas commissioned by English Touring Opera for young audiences which have been widely performed and have won him much critical acclaim.

The event will also celebrate the charity's Founder, Archbishop John Whitgift, whose legacy to the town has resulted in one of the largest bursary support schemes in the UK with £5 million granted each year to students who attend its three schools.

All proceeds from the concert will be donated to The Whitgift Foundation Bursary Appeal to enable talented young people to attend our schools from many different backgrounds and walks of life.

In addition to the evening event, young musicians from the three schools will entertain local primary school children in an interactive morning concert as part of The Whitgift Foundation outreach programme.
