


Year 10 Diabetes



As the Christmas holidays approach and we enjoy festive treats, sweeties and cakes, spare a thought for your pancreas. Year 10 researched and presented on the rising rates of type 2 diabetes in the UK.

They invited the School Health Officer into their biology lesson and explained the risks to individuals and society. We were split up into four groups to focus on different topics related to type 2 diabetes, "What is the proportion of adults with type 2 diabetes?", "Why type 2 diabetes is increasing?", "The social impact of type 2 diabetes" and "What should be



done to reduce type 2 diabetes in the future?".

In our groups, we created some fabulous, detailed posters which we presented to the Health Officer. We had the opportunity to ask any questions on the topic we had, which helped increase our understanding of type 2 diabetes immensely. The RI Christmas Lectures are a televised series of lectures aimed at young people and highlighting a different area of science each year. This year's series of three lectures will be shown on BBC4 on 26th, 27th and 28th December at 8pm.



We all really enjoyed taking part and it didn't matter that we didn't win - we had fun! Thank you to Mrs Tamplin for taking us.








A Celebration of Christmas (Year 3 -5)
