CREST Awards



Well done to the 48 students who were awarded their Bronze CREST Certificate last week. CREST is a scheme run by the British Science Association (BSA) that inspires young people to think and behave like scientists and engineers. It is a nationally recognised scheme for student-led project work in the STEM subjects.

To achieve the Bronze CREST Award students had to work in a team to plan and run a project addressing a real world STEM problem. Some of the projects chosen this year included developing a healthy sugar free drink, making vegan toothpaste and comparing it to other commercially available toothpastes and finding out about the causes and consequences of dehydration in order to devise some experiments to investigate the constituents of commercially available oral rehydration salts (ORS).






Year 12: Visualising very small things in Chemistry

In Chemistry we are studying electron configuration and how electrons are arranged in their shells and sub-shells. Electrons are held inside orbitals which have different shapes. S-orbitals (spherical) are shown as the circles and the p-orbitals (dumb-bell) are shown as the loops. To be able to understand the orbitals better, we made a visual model that showed its 3D structure clearly. This was very helpful and provides a good foundation for our learning.
