
Week 5: House Challenge to Walk Around the World

STEM and House Walking Challenge Combined





Over half term I went on a long walk with my family. One thing I miss about school is swimming and PE lessons. It is good to get out for what my mum calls a 'leg stretch'.

We walked around Lloyd Park to do some research for a STEM competition that some of us in Years 8 and 9 are entering about building a home for nature. There are quite a few species that are endangered in the UK. The aim of the project is to promote biodiversity in our local area.

It was not recommended to choose something like red squirrels, which are only found in Dorset and the Isle of Wight; instead, we had to think about what we might find at school, in our gardens or local parks. I like stag beetles and recently watched a fascinating programme on bats.

It was really muddy. We walked from the Prep site, round Lloyd Park, across to Croham Hurst Woods, Littleheath Woods in Selsdon and back down through Bramley Bank. I got lots of ideas. In total we walked 10.6 km (16,676 steps) and on the map it looks a bit like a mirror image of a calligraphy 'S for Stafford'.

International Mother Language Day

The pandemic has highlighted the importance of communication, which for aurally challenged people, and those who lip-read, the wearing of masks has made extremely difficult. This is where sign language is so invaluable. This week, we have been learning some BSL including greetings, alphabet and animals.

UNO Fitness





Each colour represented a different activity and the number indicated how many repetitions of each activity needed to be performed. Students played in Teams, drawing cards from the pile for the opposing team to complete. Some classes worked together, others in breakout rooms.

If you've played UNO you will know there are also WILD CARDS and these were implemented into the fitness activity. Draw 2 card meant the opposing team had to complete the next two activities consecutively: Skip a turn card caused the team to skip on the spot for 30secs: 4+ led to four consecutive exercises and so on.

If you have a pack of UNO cards at home, why not give it a go?

Games of Chance



Learning online can provide some fantastic opportunities to use interactive tasks as a class. On Tuesday, students in Mrs Morris' Year 8 Mathematics class took part in a fun activity designed to enhance their understanding of experimental probability.

As they soon discovered, games of chance don't exactly fit the theory! Looking at the spinner in the diagram, they correctly predicted that you would be most likely to win on red, and that this would happen about three quarters of the time. When they played the game 36 times at once however, some found that the results were way off the expected 27 wins. It was when their results were put together, creating hundreds of "trials", that they could see the results were close to what they expected.

We discussed the results and went on to a broader discussion about how probabilities are estimated from experiments in real life, from predicting the weather to calculating the effectiveness of vaccines.





Students in KS3 have been encouraged to help CROYDON boost its ranking in the Virtual London Youth Games.


This week's challenge was the PLANK SHOULDER TAP.

Ramses: 'Omg. This is so good! Thank you. I am going to print it and hang it in my room'.


We hope to work with Old Palace again in the future. The ambassadors had a blast!
