Five Black Chemists that Changed the World

Patricia Bath

Patricia Bath was a significant black figure, who brought new inventions which contributed to the scientific development of the world. She had many great achievements which included, being the first African-American female doctor to create a medical device and also being the first person to invent laserphaco cataract surgery. She was also the 1st African American to complete medical training in ophthalmology. Bath had a passion for science from a very young age as at the age of 16, she attended the National Science Foundation's cancer research workshop where she was awarded for her scientific findings.

During her time at Columbia University, she figured that African Americans were two times more likely to develop blindness and eight times more likely to develop glaucoma. This led to her first creation of the community ophthalmology system that was for the eye care for people who simply were not able afford it. Bath has had several more achievements which have not yet been fully recognised and referred to by society.

James Andrew Harris - 'The African American Innovator and Hero'



James Andrew Harris played a prominent role in discovering two elements, element 104 (rutherfordium) and element 105 (dubnium). This had made him the first black scientist to have discovered an element.

After getting a bachelor's degree in university, Harris served in the US army working his way to the

honourable role of 'sergeant'. After being discharged, Harris tried to find a job as a chemist but struggled due to racial discrimination as most employers thought that a black man wasn't qualified to work in science. Harris eventually found a job as a radiochemist in 1955 where he worked for 5 years but his best work was in the 1960s – 1970s where he worked in the national lab, leading the Heavy Isotopes Production Group as part of the Nuclear Chemistry Division where he prepared targets for the discovery of heavy elements.

After making such important scientific discoveries, Harris worked to ensure that other African American children could have the opportunities and education that he had. After being awarded his honorary doctorate, Harris travelled to schools and universities across the nation to talk to young African American students, especially those from disadvantaged communities, and educate them in Science.

Mae Jemison



Mae Jemison was the first female of colour to travel in space in 1992. Not only is being an astronaut an incredible feat, for anyone – not just a person of colour, she was also a doctor and an engineer. In addition to the many awards that she has earnt, Jemison has been enlisted in the National Women's hall of fame, alongside the International space hall of fame.

Her first mission on September 28th, 1989 declared her as the first African American woman in space, where she was selected to join the STS-47 crew consisting of six other members as a Mission Specialist. The team made 127 orbits around Earth and returning to Florida on September 20, 1992. After serving six years as an astronaut, Jemison left her life at NASA and soon started teaching at Dartmouth College and started the Jemison institute for Advancing Technology in developing countries. She was even asked to feature in an episode of *Star Trek: The Next Generation* to play as Lieutenant Palmer in one of the episodes.

Jemison is now leading the 100 year Star ship project through the DARPA, (the Defence Advanced Research Projects Agency), in the United States and inspiring many young women of colour with her story.

Five Black Chemists that Changed the World continued

George Washington Carver



First schooled in a one-room schoolhouse in Southwest Missouri at the age of 12, George Washington Carver went on to attend high school in Kansas and was the first black student to attend Simpson College in Indianola, Iowa, from which he transferred to Iowa Agricultural College.

In 1896, Dr Carver became the first black faculty member of Iowa College. He was very interested in helping poor southern farmers who were farming on Iow quality soil depleted of nutrients after decades of growing only cotton and tobacco

in the same areas. Dr Carver and others encouraged farmers to systematically rotate their crops in order to restore nitrogen to the soil.

Through separation of the fats, oils, gums, resins and sugars, he discovered hundreds of additional uses of peanuts, which helped to save the economy of the southern part of the U.S.

Betty Harris



Dr Betty Harris is an American chemist. She was born on the 29th of July 1940, and is currently 81 years old. She is well known for her work as the leading expert on explosives, environmental remediation, and hazardous waste treatment. From a young age she showed an interest in chemistry and it was always here favourite subject at her school in Louisiana where she gained a qualification and PhD in chemistry at the university of New Mexico. in National Laboratory, she worked in areas of hazardous exposure and radioactive materials. She became a world renowned expert in explosives. Dr Harris got a patent for her invention of a spot test to identify explosives in the environment.

More recently, she has worked with the girl scouts to develop a chemistry badge that the boy scouts already have. She recognised very early on that women should be given the same opportunities as boys regardless of race or gender. Growing up this is one of the challenges she faced and hoped that she could change this for girls growing up after her. For her achievements throughout her life she has received the state's Governor's Trailblazer Award.





Congratulations to all the runners. However, a special mention must go to Ellie in Year 6 who finished 4th overall.





Playing Games Online !



Did you know that the UK's internet use has doubled due to the pandemic? Video conferencing, home-working and especially online gaming have all contributed to the increase. Online gaming had such a big impact on the UK's broadband consumption, that many of the major data spikes (increases) focussed around updates to popular PlayStation, PC and Xbox games - including Call of Duty and Fortnite! Online gaming can be a lot of fun and bring a welcome relief and escapism from being in lockdown. Games like Fortnite, Call of Duty, Minecraft, Overwatch, Animal Crossing, Player Unknown Battlegrounds, League of Legends, Among Us, Apex: Legends, etc are all exciting and a great distraction from being stuck inside!

You can play on games consoles, apps or websites, mobiles, tablets, PCs, or through smart speakers and virtual reality headsets. Some of the reasons people like to play games online include:

- socialising with friends. When gaming you can play together on the same team, or play against each other.
- games based on location, such as Pokémon Go and Wizards Unite, encourage players to go outside and explore.
- games are designed to be entertaining.
- watching your favourite gamers on YouTube or livestreaming on Twitch. You may also want to livestream yourself playing games.

What are the Risks of Online Games?



Along with the massive increase in online gaming during lockdown, there has also been an increase in risks associated with online gaming. Here are some of the negatives associated with online gaming:

Being Bullied

- You may be deliberately excluded from a game by your friends, or criticised for how well you play. Other players may use abusive language over voice chat, and this can be upsetting.
- If you are experiencing bullying in online games, you need to talk to a parent or a responsible adult or contact Childline
- You can use the blocking and reporting functions in a game, so you can prevent bullies from contacting you.

In Game Purchases

Many free games are designed to make the player want to continue, but need payments to make this possible, which can be very frustrating. These often take the form of microtransactions, often known as MTX. This is where users can purchase virtual goods with micropayments.

Microtransactions are often used in free-to-play games to provide a revenue source for games developers. These can lead to a player spending large amounts of money if they want to progress. Loot boxes are another form of microtransactions, Loot boxes, which are purchased by two in five (40%) of young gamers, are items embedded within games, containing randomised rewards which are uncertain at the point of purchase. These can be cosmetic, such as 'skins' that change the appearance of an in game character, or provide users with an advantage in gameplay.

Many people view loot boxes as a negative aspect of gaming and want them banned, due to the gambling element of getting a randomised reward for money!

Trolling, "Griefing" & Scams

'Griefers' are gamers who deliberately try to ruin the game for other players. This can also be called trolling. Players may also try to trick or scam people into giving up 'skins' or other in game items by offering them money or by hacking their account.

Some skins are extremely rare and valuable so losing them can be as upsetting as losing a favourite toy or possession.

What is skin gambling?

A skin changes the look of an item in a video game. For example: the same gun in a game can have different 'skins'. The skins make the gun look differently.

Some skins are much rarer than others . Skin betting is when skins are used to bet or for gambling. These skins become the tokens you can gamble with. Some skins are so rare they are worth hundreds of pounds. Some specialist websites are dedicated to gambling skins. This is seen as introducing young people to gambling. Many people want skin gambling banned because of this.



Addiction

Though games are fun and engaging, sometimes playing for long periods can lead to addiction, where an unhealthy obsession can develop!

Talking to People you don't know

Some games are designed to be played in teams or against other people, and sometimes players can be based in different locations. This means young people can easily play with people they don't know and haven't met. They can communicate using voice, video or text chat. Some gamers use voice chat to discuss tactics and many games have a chat room.

There's a risk of young people being groomed on these platforms.

How to Play your Games Online Safely!

Here are some of the smart ways to look after yourself when playing online:

Check the Game's Content



Most games have an age rating based on their themes. Games with violent and sexual content will have a higher rating. The age rating system is provided by PEGI and gives an overview of individual games which can help you to decide if it's appropriate. The ratings don't include communication features, so a game with a low age rating may let children speak to people they don't know.

Some games may appear age appropriate, but are probably not.

Project Makeover

Official age rating 4+



Project Makeover is a puzzle game where you're set different tasks to makeover a client's physical appearance and home. To complete the makeover, you must play a candy crush style game and win gems to gain access to beauty tools, clothes and interior choices.

The game has in app purchases where players can buy access to new features and tools to help them complete the makeover quicker. The game also promotes specific beauty ideals and the idea that there is a correlation between what you look like and being happy.

Hello Neighbour

Official age rating 12+

Hello Neighbour is a horror game where you break into a neighbour's house to investigate their suspicious behaviour. You must perform various tasks and gain access to the basement without being caught.

Gacha Life

Official age rating 9+



Life is a role play game where you can create and dress anime style characters. You can also join scenes and chat with other players and play games as your character.

The game is rated 9+ on the Apple App and Google Play store. You should be aware that is has an in app chat feature and in game purchases are available. Be careful about sharing information on the app and who you are talking to. You shouldn't share any personal information.

Change the Game's Settings



It can be difficult to keep up with the privacy and security settings of the latest games, but some games let players turn off communications features, mute voice chat and report other plays who behave inappropriately.

Talk to your Parents or a Trusted Adult

Talk to your parent or a trusted adult about any concerns you have about playing games online. Tell your parent about the games you are playing and see if you can play them together and agree which ones are appropriate.


Safer Internet Week £50 Note Design Competition
