Black British Voices in Theatre and Film: Presentation and Discussion

Before half term, A-Level Drama students researched and delivered a presentation to Sixth Form students about black British voices in theatre and film.

The presentation celebrated the contributions of key theatre and film practitioners. Students discussed the training and career of actors Idris Elba, Gugu Mbatha-Raw and Daniel Kaluyaa. They also discussed playwright and producer Tobi Kyeremateng's work and the prolific contributions Dawn Walton has made to the theatre industry as the founder of Eclipse Theatre.

The presentation was followed by a discussion of the importance of telling black stories. Students also considered what stories they would like to see on



stage and how theatres could market work to wider audiences.

A-Level Drama Trip - White Noise at The Bridge Theatre

Before the half term break, our Year 12 and 13 A-Level Drama students went on a trip to The Bridge Theatre in Central London to watch *White Noise*. Written by Pulitzer Prize-winning Suzan-Lori Parks, *White Noise* is a commentary on current issues of race told to us by a group of friends living in America today.

It is a striking, impactful and thought-provoking play. Students saw this production in preparation for the A-Level written examination, where they are asked to evaluate a live theatre production. The students thought the production was very moving and insightful, with some returning to see it again with their friends and family.





Black History Month – Drama and English Workshop: *Small Island*



Drama and English students collaborated to plan and deliver an after school workshop for Years 10 -13 on the play adaptation of Andrea Levy's novel, *Small Island*. This was an exciting opportunity for students to work together to explore this powerful text.

Over the half term, participants watched the National Theatre's production using the school's Drama Online account, which helped them prepare for the workshop. The workshop began with an introduction from the English students to the context of the Windrush migration and contributions of Caribbean people during wartime.

They then led students in a discussion, analysing a key scene from the play. The workshop moved from a classroom into the Drama Studio, where drama students led participants in a practical exploration of the scene they had analysed.

The workshop allowed students to explore the themes of pride and identity present in the play both through discussion and acting technique. Thank you to the students who organised and attended this workshop.

Student Led Halloween Puppeteering Workshop in Year 7 Drama Club

In Year 7 Drama Club, students were lucky enough to be welcomed back to school with a Halloween themed puppeteering workshop led by the Palace Players. Palace Players is our Drama Club for students in Years 10 and above, who are also our Drama Student Leadership Team.

Having previously participated in a workshop with professional puppeteering theatre company 'Half a String', the Palace Players were able to teach the students the main principles of puppeteering of the ancient Japanese puppetry style of 'Bunraku'. They showed Year 7 students some fantastic examples using techniques and principles learnt with 'Half a String' using only ordinary objects such as cloths and cups.

The three principles of puppeteering the Year 7s learnt were breathing, weight and focus. In groups the Year 7s then had the chance to try this themselves and puppeteer some objects. In keeping with the Halloween theme, they focused on an extract from Roald Dahl's *The Witches*. The groups then

performed their scary extracts from *The Witches* in front of everyone in eerie, dim orange lighting.



Year 13 Healthy Active Lifestyle



Last week, Year 13 students enjoyed an engaging session with an external Martial Arts coach as part of their Healthy Active Lifestyle lesson.

The session focused on Self-Defence. The instructor talked to the students about the importance of adopting a strategy of awareness and avoidance whilst enjoying life as young adults. They got the chance to experience and demonstrate different movements and actions that could help get them out of a difficult situation.

The instructor was really good at explaining what to do in different situations, but also provided some basic but important key points e.g: not wearing your lanyard outside school/university as it highlights you are a student and, if labelled, tells someone



where you are studying and in some cases your name.

The students really enjoyed the session and whilst we hope they never have to use the skills learnt, they will know what to do if necessary.

The techniques that we were taught will never be forgotten; I didn't imagine that such simple movements could be so effective and potentially save lives.

It was interesting to learn that these techniques should only be used as a last resort and that the key aim of self defence is to avoid any potentially harmful situation by being constantly aware of our surroundings.



The lesson, taught by a skilled and zealous teacher, was very engaging and I enjoyed learning the surprisingly easy but extremely effective techniques of self defence. **Bethany**

The approach of teaching self-defence was memorable and useful in the sense that we were made aware of the flexibility of simple movements that are applicable in a multitude of dangerous situations, yet our main concern is to stay aware and avoid such precautions from being used. World Space Week 2021- A Learning Experience about Women in 'Space'

Congratulations to the winners and runner ups for the World Space Week Poster Competition. The Physics Department was very pleased with the number and quality of entries from students. The effort put in by students was commendable.

World Space Week 2021 was celebrated at Old Palace and worldwide from the 4th to the 10th of October 2021 and coincided with the beginning of the Black History Month. The theme for this year's World Space Week was 'Women in Space'. Students had the opportunity to research and recognise the work of amazing black women in space ranging from astronauts such as Mae Jemison (first African American woman to be admitted into NASA's astronaut training programme) and Joan Higginbotham (third African American woman to go into space) to Katherine Johnson, a NASA mathematician whose handwritten calculations of orbital mechanics were pivotal to the success of the first and

subsequent US crewed space flights.

This was a good learning opportunity for students to see how the Physics they are learning in school can be applied to real life applications and how women like themselves have been and continue to contribute to various STEM careers in this field.



Evensong

This week, Polyphonic sung their second Evensong of the academic year. They sung Dyson's *Evening Service* which sounded beautiful and grand in the Croydon Minster acoustic. The anthem was *Laudate Pueri* by Mendelssohn, which is an expressive piece with lots of interweaving layers – perfect for our Polyphonic choir! (Polyphonic is a musical term for a texture where lots of different melodies play at the same time).

Miss Orr accompanied the choir on the organ and played a beautiful organ voluntary at the end of the service. The choir have been working very hard learning lots of repertoire this half term and are excited to get started on Christmas music for our Alumni Carol Service on the 6th December.

Our next Evensong is on the 28th of February, and all are welcome.





Year 4: Warp and Weft



Biology Practical Work

In Biology this term students have been doing a lot of practicals with vegetables. Year 12 have used beetroot and potato to understand about cell membranes and Year 9 made preparations of onion skin to improve their microscope skills.

Can you guess what Year 10 were studying?

How about we play a little guessing game? You consume 7-10 miles of it during every single meal. It can stretch from the Earth to the sun and back - 600 times. It's 99.9% the same as any other human.

Have you guessed it yet? It's... DNA.

DNA is the material that carries all the information about how a living thing will look and function. In our Biology lesson, my classmates and I extracted DNA from peas. We mashed up the peas and mixed them with washing up liquid. This breaks open the cells, releasing the DNA from within the cells. Eventually, a white layer formed between the pea juice and ethanol, which was the DNA.

It was a fascinating experiment that allowed us to witness in plain sight the exact thing that makes us, US. If you would like to delve deeper into the wondrous world of DNA, I would advise reading the Science Museum blog article on DNA.



Clubs: Spotlight on... Geography

Our theme in Geography Club this term is 'Are we drowning in plastic?' Our aim is to promote the global challenge of what to do with our plastic waste.

Inspired by the TV programme 'War on Plastic' we started by surveying the school, collecting plastic bottles in form rooms – we collected 157 in 5 days! We then calculated that across a school year this could equate to 5,800 bottles, that's 40,000 bottles during an average student's seven years at Senior School. That is a LOT of single use plastic!

Our club includes students from Year 7 to 12, and we are currently creating an awareness campaign which we hope will encourage everyone to think before buying items of single use plastic. We are creating a mosaic using bottle tops to highlight the damage plastic can do to wildlife, and planning to create a wall installation using bottles too. We also hope to work with the canteen to reduce our use of plastics even further.

6 facts about single use plastic:

- 73% of beach litter is plastic
- Plastic is made from oil which is a fossil fuel. (Recycling plastic uses 80% less energy that making new plastics)
- More than 5 trillion pieces of plastic are already floating in our oceans
- Each 1 litre plastic bottle uses 4 million joules of energy to make
- World plastic production has increased from 2.1 million tonnes in 1950 to 406 million in 2015
- 1 million plastic drinks bottles are sold every minute globally – nearly half are produced by one company

One important thing that we learnt is how to stay vigilant and be aware of your surroundings and potential attackers. We role-played a situation where Nathanial (one of the visitors) had a prop knife – he told us what to do and how to get out of this predicament.

Year 6 Anderson Shelter Experiment

Year 6 had great fun designing, building, and testing models of Anderson shelters that were used during World War II.

The girls did a lot of research prior to building their models and learnt that they were first designed in 1938 to protect people from the persistent bombing during an air raid. On average, they would fit up to six people and over three million Anderson shelters were put up all over Britain.


In fact, two of the Year 6 girls have a genuine Anderson shelter in their garden! Did you also know that they were free to families who earned less than £250 a year?

Year 6 had the task of building a model that would house a Lego figure, withstand a weight of 1kg and keep the Lego figure dry when 500ml of water is poured over it.

In the end, every model fulfilled at least two of the requirements and are still standing, which is a great success.

"I was terrified and worried that my shelter would crush under the 1kg weight!" said Elise, "But it did not because the cardboard I had used was strong."

The Scholastic Book Fair will be on for two weeks starting from 25th November.

The Library is very much at the heart of the Prep School.

Students use the Library for their Library lessons as part of one of their English lessons once a week. It is also open three days a week at lunchtime from 12.25pm to 12.45pm for Years 3 to 6 to visit the Library for quiet reading, borrowing books or catching up with their AR quizzes.

Accelerated Reading (AR) is the reading program we use to monitor students' comprehension, which they can also access from home to complete their quizzes.

The Library is updated frequently with new fiction and non-fiction books. eBooks are available for Years 3 to 6 on an e-platform, and in addition, online Britannica is also available for extra research for their topic work. All these can be accessed through the school VLE. Both the Prep and Senior Libraries liaise closely with each other and share resources between them.

During Tuesday lunchtimes, the Year 6 students are very much engaged in reading a combination of scientific fiction and non-fiction books as part of their judging roles for the Royal Society of Young People Book Prize.

ChemSoc: Magical Chemistry





Last week, ChemSoc took on a Harry Potter theme as our chemists investigated Practical Potions. The session began with some demonstrations from Professor Katerina and Professor Clara (aka Mrs Ball and Mrs Marren, complete with witches' hats), involving amazing colour changes ("Chroma mutatio!") and even a genie being released from a bottle!

The students then investigated a selection of "magical potions" to see which pairs reacted together and, using their knowledge and understanding of Chemistry, competed to determine which chemicals the potions contained.


I enjoyed the atmosphere and loved it when the teachers started dancing to 'Friend Like Me' from Aladdin as the 'genie' was released! - **Aashni**


