Old Palace alumnae, Fiona McNevin, left in 2018 with a place to study French and Latin at St. Andrews University in Scotland. In September, as part of her course, she flew to Russia to study at the Yaroslavl State University. Fiona has kindly offered to provide a regular update on her experience of studying in this fascinating country. Here she writes about her first month:



Languages was a passion of mine that Old Palace not only encouraged but celebrated – I was provided with numerous opportunities to challenge myself such as taking four language GCSEs in Year 11 and studying Russian GCSE alongside my A-Levels. I am still beyond grateful that I was able to explore language-learning in such a supportive environment, and I know I wouldn't be where I am today without the school's encouragement. I also have a huge amount to thank the University of St Andrews for. The flexibility of their degree programmes meant I arrived studying French & Latin, with Russian as my chosen third subject (all students study three subjects in first and second year) but switched my degree in Semester 2 of first year to French & Russian, after becoming so enthused by the Russian department at university.

Studying languages had been my dream for a long time, and the thrill of a study abroad opportunity played a huge role in my motivation to make sure I achieved my goals. Fast-forward through GCSEs, A-Levels, and countless essays and exams at university (not to mention a pandemic), and I've made it! I flew to Russia on the 1st September and I can safely say that all the hard work and effort has been worth it.



I am currently living in Yaroslavl, a beautiful historic city situated where the Volga and Kotorosl rivers meet, around 250km north-east of Moscow. I am living in an apartment with a host for total immersion, a lovely Russian lady called Anna Borisovna. Along with two other students from St Andrews, I study at Yaroslavl State University Monday- Friday for four hours on an intensive course designed to fully engage us in the language and culture here in Russia.

The past month has been absolutely incredible. Despite the pre-departure nerves and the year's delay, I am enjoying myself to the full and

experiencing as much as I can of what Russia has to offer. I have visited countless beautiful churches with their unique onion dome architecture and gleaming golden interiors, a number of hidden gem museums in Yaroslavl such as the museum of Music and Time which was full of unusual collections of bells, gramophones, clocks and irons (why not?!) and a fascinating working elk farm in Kostroma, a nearby city. I've watched a Chekhov play, supported the local team at an ice hockey match and I am also attending choir twice a week where we sing a range of songs all completely in Russian. It was tough to start with but with the help of some lovely Russian students I seem to have

grasped the necessary vocabulary to fully understand a rehearsal! We are currently practicing for a concert in Moscow in late November, and I'm hoping we will sing some carols soon.

Every day brings new experiences and I am so grateful to be living and learning in Russia. Whatever you choose to study, I would recommend looking at the study abroad programmes at your chosen university – it's an opportunity not to be missed.

In Memory of Jean Smith née Clayton

In the autumn 2020 edition of the OPA News, Maureen Bunn wrote of a "lifetime of friendship" in which she referred to her first day at school and being placed near "the lovely Miss Clayton".

It so happened that although a pupil of Miss Clayton for my last two years at school, I enjoyed a lifetime of friendship with her. This came about through our mutual love of classical music rather than literature. (Jean had wanted to study music at university but her father forbade it). Perhaps those of you who knew her at school may like to know a little more about the rest of her life.

After leaving OP, Jean returned home (Harrow) and taught in a local school. She met Edward Smith through their local church, they married and went on to have three children: first a boy followed by two girls. Very sadly and unexpectedly, Edward died from a heart attack when still quite young. At that time they lived in Ashtead, Surrey but Jean soon moved, together with her mother, into a beautiful bungalow in Liphook to be near her elder daughter, Katherine. Jean had always taken her religion very seriously and soon got involved with a local prayer group.

After several years, Jean's mother died, by which time Katherine's family had

moved to Buckinghamshire. There were difficult times brewing for them and Jean felt she wanted to be nearer to support Katherine, so she bought another bungalow nearby. Because of the geographical distance, I seldom saw Jean, but we kept in touch by letter. During this time, Jean felt moved to join the Order of St. Francis which entailed living by the rules of that Order.

In 2017 Jean suffered a severe stoke which left her almost totally paralysed and wheelchair-bound. Her speech was far from easy to understand but I phoned her every month until she died in September 2018. Sadly, I had not been able to visit her or attend her funeral due to my own position as a full time carer.

I planted Michaelmas daises in my garden in her memory and as a reminder of where it all began: dear Old Palace!

Cecilia Mollie Louise Langford

1930-2021

When I saw the advertisement for a job at Old Palace, it seemed a good omen and I applied straight away. A good omen because my aunt, Mollie Langford, taught English here in the early sixties.

The Sisters of the Church were still running the school when Mollie was here. The staff room was in what is now the Ayckbowm Room. The whole school could fit into Chapel, and in those days you had to wear a hat for services. Mollie remembered running through the Guard Room to get to Chapel, cramming on the beret that she kept ready in her pocket. Mollie was here when the Queen paid her first visit to the school. (I was here for the second!)

She didn't stay at Old Palace long: when I was born, she moved back to Hastings to be near my mother. She got a post at Beresford Houses, a girls' independent boarding school in Eastbourne. She spent the rest of her career there, rising to Head of English and eventually Deputy Head. When she retired, she looked after her parents until they died. She and my mother later moved to Scotland to be near my brother. When he and his family emigrated to Australia about ten years ago, Mollie and Mother moved to Derbyshire.

Sadly, Mollie suffered from dementia in the last few years, and eventually had to move into a care home. She was then diagnosed with cancer, but proved remarkably resilient: the suggested "weeks or months" turned out to be over a year. The Covid lockdowns sadly meant very limited visits, but she died peacefully at the care home in March.

Over the years, I have met a few people she taught and have heard that she was a very good teacher. She certainly fostered in me and my siblings a great love of reading and learning. I cannot imagine a more wonderful aunt: we all miss her very much.

Mary Tooke

(née Van Gyseghem) 1930-36

Mary's daughter has informed us that her mother and OP alumnae (1930-36), Mary Tooke (née Van Gyseghem), passed away peacefully on 27th August 2021. She was 101 years old!

Eileen Mary Durrant

1938-43

Eileen's daughter, Ann Russell writes: My mother, Eileen Mary Durrant, sadly passed away on 18th April 2021 in East Surrey Hospital. She was aged 94 years and leaves her loving husband George (they were married for 67 years). She also leaves two daughters: Jill and Ann; grandchildren Claire, David, Joanne, Nicholas, Alex and Charlotte and great grandchildren Elsbeth and Alara.

She attended Old Palace from 1938 to 1943. She loved her school years and never stopped talking fondly of her time there. The nuns had a big influence on her and she kept her bible and prayer books they gave her.

She was evacuated to Eastbourne in 1939. She was given a gas mask and the children were paraded at Eastbourne train station. They were given biscuits and emergency rations. Local people came to a hall and were given rations for the children. Then volunteers took any remaining children to houses – knocking on doors to see who would have them.

Eileen was taken in by a lady who ran a guesthouse. The teachers from Old Palace School accompanied the children and slots at a local college were arranged, so they could continue their studies. Eileen was only there three months until December 1939, as the bombing that was expected didn't happen. This was ironic as she was sent back home to Thornton Heath when in Spring of 1940 the blitz bombing started.

She talked so fondly of her time there and I know how much the nuns and School really shaped her life. She felt very blessed to have won a scholarship to enable her to attend this wonderful School.

Julie Chapman

(née Ray) 1962 - 69

It is with a very heavy heart that I have to inform you that after a long illness Julie passed away last Saturday.

She had T Cell Lymphoma which we all thought had gone away but the chemo drugs gave her cardio myopathy and then the Lymphoma came back.

She had spent many weeks in hospital during the last 18 months but, having contracted Sepsis for the second time, suffered a cardiac arrest during the night. Although they managed to revive her, sadly she passed away the following day surrounded by Colin and her two sons.
