Cast Interviews

Art: Disability History Month

For this year's Disability History Month (November 18th to December 18th), the Art Department invited students to participate in a sensory photography contest inspired by the work of blind and partially-sighted photographers.

The winners of the contest were two Year 12 students, lone and Chloe-Marie. Many congratulations to you both.



The piece is called hyperopia which is the medical/scientific term for longsightedness. Often when we think of disability and being able-bodied we might think of amputees, someone who is deaf or hard of hearing, or someone who is blind or partially sighted. These disabilities all have aids such as, prosthetic limbs, hearing aids, cochlear implants, or canes respectively. In order to give an understanding of the importance of these aids, I chose to compare them to something which everyone should be familiar with: glasses.

Like hyperopia, glasses help us to see in 20/20 vision like those without hyperopia or myopia. Disability aids are just as beneficial and helpful to those with disabilities as glasses are. However the main difference is there can be a lot of stigma around them.

Many people may wear glasses for the aesthetic rather than the need as it has become socially acceptable and without stigma to wear them. I felt it was important to make the comparison between glasses and disability aids to show that there shouldn't be any stigma and aids such as hearing aids or prosthetics should be just as socially acceptable as wearing a pair of glasses.

Photography is about perspective and just because some people are partially sighted doesn't mean they can't take photographs. They just look at the world differently by using their senses



- hearing, touch, taste and smell - when taking pictures.

I was inspired by a photographer called lan Treherne who was born profoundly

deaf and started going blind gradually at the age of 15 due to a rare genetic condition called Usher syndrome.

Treherne's window of vision is demonstrated in this representation of his eyesight in which he has only 5% left. In my picture of daisies, I wanted to contrast what is seen in the normal visual world compared to partially sighted/ blind people's vision.

Year 2: Chinese New Year

Alice brought in some information and decorations to share with the class, which included a fabulous dragon made by her sister Abigail in Pre School. Victoria sent in a video of a

Dragon toy her brother has at home and we talked about the significance of the dragon and the type of musical instruments used to create the music.

Year 2 have also been creating their own Chinese music using the Pentatonic Scale on xylophones. All girls at Prep have been learning a special 'Chinese New Year' song which is sung to the tune of *Frère Jacques*. Year 2 can sing it in four parts which is very impressive! The song talks about the traditional Chinese colours of red and gold, drums, dragons, dancing, lanterns and it being a time for families and friends to get together.

The answer is 394

If you take the second statement, 7 is incorrect from the first statement and 1 is incorrect from the fourth statement. Hence 4 is correct but not in the second place. From the third statement, 4 is not in the first place. Hence 4 is in the 3rd place.

From the fifth statement either 6 or 9 is correct. But combining it with the third statement, 6 is incorrect. Hence along with the first statement, 9 is correct and in the second place.
