There are lots of opportunities to be active – please make the most of






Swimming: St David's Gala Success

Music Award Holders Workshop

Recently we had a workshop for Music Award-holders on Orchestral Conducting with the wonderful Colin Dowdeswell MBE, who has had a varied and impressive career, including as founder and conductor of The Camerata, a string chamber orchestra.

Anna in Year 12 writes of her experience:

"The music workshop on conducting was highly beneficial and enlightening on a conductor's role in the orchestra. As a violinist, I am dependent on the conductor for cues and tempo, however I was completely unaware of how complex their job was. Indicating accents, conveying the dynamics and the character of the piece, while simultaneously keeping a consistent beat pattern in the correct tempo was very difficult. I found it tricky simply keeping a four-beat pattern correctly.

My favourite part of the workshop was conducting a small orchestra and cuing in second violins and cellos in a round. It was challenging and ultimately gave me a lot of respect and sympathy for conductors."





Year 4: Blue Abyss

During the Easter holiday, in preparation for our new topic 'Blue Abyss', Year 4 produced work on either the world's oceans or the layers of the oceans and animals that live there. Hiru's work was presented as a game. Each girl was given an animal card and had to decide which layer of the ocean they live in. Year 4 also produced some beautifully presented information posters.

This week, we have been learning about the layers of the ocean in more detail, particularly the extreme conditions. In the lowest Hadopelagic zone (or trenches) it is 0°C and pitch black so most of the animals are adapted to be blind or semiblind. The pressure is 600-1000 atmospheres or equivalent to a 600-1000kg weight on your finger nail!

We have also learnt about James Cameron's voyage to Challenger Deep, the lowest point on Earth in the Mariana Trench, at a depth of nearly 11,000m!




Clubs: Spotlight on... Classical

There are three Classical clubs on offer at Old Palace. Year 7 and 8 students attend **Classical Film Club** where we watch and discuss films about mythology and the ancient world. We look at the presentations of Pompeii in the Roman Mysteries series and have enjoyed recreating some of the more exciting moments in the Storyteller Greek Myths series through the medium of drama.

Year 9-10 students attend **Mythology Club**. This club incorporates reading myths from Ovid and other authors in translation, discussion and appreciation of artistic representations of these myths, and the opportunity to respond creatively to these stories and characters. The club increases the student understanding of the ancient world and allows a great deal of creative expression.

There is also the **Symposium Society**, open to students in years 11-13. This society meets on a half term basis to discuss an area of the ancient world not covered in the examination specifications. Recent discussions have been focused on Sophocles' Antigone and Roman victory arches.

The wide range of clubs on offer allow students to explore more unusual areas of the ancient world, express themselves and develop key skills and confidence.

When you're ready for something harder, you can be supported in choosing something suitable for your


skill level. All equipment and materials can be provided.

Year 8: Outdoor Maths Lesson

Year 8 enjoyed having an outdoor Mathematics lesson to introduce the "Loci" topic this week. In their groups, they had to follow the rules for the loci and see what shapes they formed.







Year 4: Measuring in Maths

Last week, Year 4 were learning to estimate and measure length, mass and capacity. For homework and in class, we identified examples of each as guidelines. We then estimated and measured the length, mass or capacity of a few objects, using scales, metre rules, tape measures, trundle wheels and measuring cups and cylinders.

Some of the measurements surprised us, including the perimeter of the playground – we had underestimated! However, some of our estimates were very close and we became more accurate.









Year 9: PSHE - Diversity



Just before Easter, we welcomed guest speaker Mr Lee Lawrence to a Year 9 PSHE session on 'Diversity'. Mr Lawrence shared his personal experiences and talked to students about mending relationships between community groups, reconciliations when things go wrong and creating positive communities. The session ended with an opportunity for students to ask questions.

The Cherry Groce Foundation was set up in 2016 in memory of Cherry Groce, Mr Lawrence's mother. The Foundation is "committed to carry out its work in the momentum of the positive energy that radiated from Cherry Groce and her belief that truth and justice will ultimately triumph".

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
