We Say 'Au Revoir' to Year 13




'Au Revoir' to our Year 13 Students


Well done to all the teams who took part and especially Laud for their win. We look forward to the future wins to come.








House Points

Carnegie & Kate Greenaway Awards -Shadowing Group Flming for the Awards Ceremony

Now in its 86th Year, the Carnegie Medal is one of the most prestigious children's book awards in the world.

Shadowing groups across the UK are currently reading all eight shortlisted books and deciding who will win the Shadower's Choice Award. This award will be presented along with the Carnegie Medal at the awards ceremony at the British Library on the 16th June, which our shadowing group have been invited to attend and help present an award!

The film shows our shadower's discussing the shortlisted books. This film will be shown during the awards ceremony, which will also be streamed live!

Of the filming process, Lila in Year 9 said:

"When I was first told that the Carnegie Shadowing Award would be filmed at our school, I couldn't contain my excitement. Dozens of school all over the UK would listen to me gush about my favourite books and I'd get to miss two periods? Win-win!

But that excitement quickly transitioned into nerves upon seeing all the filming equipment. Microphones that could hear a pin drop, the all-seeing eyes known as cameras, and two staff eager to capture every word we uttered.


Clubs: Spotlight on...Sceptics' Society



This Week in History...

Brown v Board of Education

On 17 May, 1954, the United States Supreme Court ruled, in the case of Brown v Board of Education, that racial segregation in schools was illegal. The decision would launch the modern Civil Rights movement.



Year 9: Around The World In 60 Minutes

On 24th May, Year 9 joined 35 groups from different schools for an hour-long online session on Mathematics and Geography.

The presenter started with a question: "What is the shortest distance between New York and Tokyo? If a plane were to make that flight, what would be the last part of North America it flew over before it hit the sea?"

Most students voted for California. which is on a straight line between New York and Tokyo on a map. Using a globe, Zoe demonstrated that it



is possible to form a triangle with three right angles in 3D space, so the shortest distance is North through Alaska and South to Tokyo without changing direction!

Students then thought about coastlines. The World Factbook states Indonesia has a coastline of 55,000km, but the World Resources Institute claims it is 95,000km. Why is this?

Students investigated by drawing a coastline on graph paper. When the presenter zoomed in on the map, she showed that lines that looked



straight were jagged. The more she zoomed in, the more jagged it was and therefore the longer the coastline was. If she carried on zooming in forever, the coastline would become infinite. even though the area of the land had not changed. This is known as the "Coastline Paradox", and is part of a Mathematics topic called "Fractals".

The presenter then turned to populations and demonstrated some surprising quirks of data and probability. If you are curious, look up "Benford's Law" to find out more.

The students enjoyed the session. Here are some of their comments:
