Year 13: Volunteering with St John Ambulance



A chance to save lives - are you ready to give it a go?

Before I started going to St John Ambulance, I didn't really have much knowledge of First Aid, but I had passion and that is what led me to pass my training program and become an Operational First Aider.

You can always level up and become a team leader, assistant leader and so much more. If you would like to earn this title, keep reading this article.

Being compassionate, considerate, and confident - does that sound like you? If it does then I have an opportunity for you. At St John Ambulance, you will learn valuable skills, especially teamwork, as you get to know everyone on your team whilst working with them to help save the lives of others. Firstly, when you join, you will have a training session with them where they brief you on the basics of First Aid. Then if you're lucky, you can do further training, followed by a practical exam to assess your CPR skills, the way how you communicate with patients of different ages and your knowledge of First Aid. If you pass this, you will earn a badge and a certificate to aid you with your CV. When you are on the team, you will be able to do duties like going to football events for free to treat people if needed and be first aiders.

To sign up for St John Ambulance you can join any unit near your town, and you do not need any past experiences or knowledge of First Aid; however, having basic common sense is necessary, since I was told that 90% of first aid is based on common sense. Also, make sure you have a clear interest in being a cadet. When you are on the team, they will give you your uniforms and ID to bring to any events that you sign up for.

To have a membership of St John Ambulance, you may need to fill in a form given by your Unit Manager and pay a deposit of £72 per year.

The visual artist claims her work to be 'Romantic' as she actively transforms abstract ideas into concrete visual


pieces by also developing the ability to build teams of fellow creatives and bring the abstract vision to life.

Oxbridge Tea: 'Should Children be Allowed to Vote in UK Elections?'

"Elections belong to the people. It's their decision." – Abraham Lincoln. So, why not let the children vote? They are people after all.

On Thursday, 14th March, Mr Seddon ran an Oxbridge Tea, discussing the much-disputed topic – 'Should children be allowed to vote in UK elections?'. David Runciman, professor of politics at Cambridge University, caused an uproar when he suggested that a possible way to advance democracy would be to allow children as young as six to vote. He argues that changing demography in "advanced postindustrial societies" makes young citizens the perpetual losers in the democratic game. Ageing societies contribute to political imbalances where older voters outnumber the younger ones, impacting electoral outcomes, and leading to policies that possibly don't align with the preferences of younger people. Despite brief moments of unity during the pandemic, it ultimately exacerbated existing generational disparities. The discontent it causes poses a significant risk to democracies, where people feel excluded, a risk that could be reduced by allowing the youngest of society to vote.

Lowering the voting age to six is suggested by Runciman as a pragmatic approach, given children's ability to express preferences and engage in the educational system.

It's argued that children in education have the resources and time to become informed voters, potentially contributing valuable perspectives to political discourse. Many question children's competency as a barrier to effective voting. Runciman challenges the notion of competence as a basis for excluding children from voting, arguing that adults also have limitations in political understanding. Should people have to pass a 'competence' test to be able to vote?

After much debate, we concluded that while it is a plausible option, such a test would never happen – nobody wants to be certified as incompetent. Disenfranchising, some may argue, at both ends of the spectrum is simply backwards for a democratic nation. Voting should be seen as a right belonging to members of a democratic community rather than solely based on individual competence. Giving children the vote is presented as a way to make political systems more responsive to the needs and perspectives of all members of society, bridging the generational divide and invigorating democracy.

However, many of us argued that giving children as young as six the

vote would cause society to go down a slippery slope. What other new rights might this lead to children demanding? What about the five/four/three-year-olds who think they are politically savvy? Do children with hardly any substantial world experience deserve the civil liberty to vote? If the parents are the ones living with them, who's to say that their vote hasn't already been influenced before they even arrived at the ballot boxes? Children need parental consent for multiple aspects of their life – would this be an exception?

Politically speaking, things do need realigning and our electoral system needs to ensure that nobody feels isolated.

It was a fascinating discussion and incredibly relevant to the upcoming elections. The Oxbridge Tea was thought-provoking, and students and teachers with different perspectives were able to share their thoughts and ideas on such a complex issue, and the input from everyone made it a truly enriching experience.

It was Emily's first marathon and she absolutely loved it!






England v Ireland in the Women's Six Nations


