International Award-winning Young Adult Authors Visit

Last Friday, Year 9+ students had the chance to meet not just one, but two international award-winning Young Adult authors.


Faridah Àbíké-Íyímídé is the author of the New York Times international bestselling young adult novels Ace of Spades and Where Sleeping Girls Lie and Adiba Jaigirdar is the YA Book Prize-winning author of The Henna Wars and Hani & Ishu's Guide to Fake Dating. Both authors were on a whistlestop tour of the UK to promote their new co-authored book, Four Eids and a Funeral, and took time during their busy schedule to visit us at Old Palace to talk about getting into writing, the process of getting a book published and their love of video games, creating characters that are diverse and realistic, drinking tea and TV shows.

After their talk, both authors took time to answer all students' questions, remaining at Old Palace long after the end of the day to talk to students and sign books.

We are very grateful to both Faridah and Adiba for their passion, humour, enthusiasm and generosity in taking the time to meet and talk to our older students.

"It was really interesting to hear about the process of getting a book published. Many authors speak about the difficulties of this process, and they didn't shy away from this; but they made publishing a book seem possible with their passion. Faridah published her first book, Ace of Spades, at only a year older than me, and this inspires me to believe that anything I want to do is achievable too"

Year 10: Biology Field Trip to Wakehurst Place

Year 10 went to Wakehurst Place to collect the data for their Core Practical in Loder Valley Nature Reserve.

They worked in groups to investigate the relationship between two plant species and their environment using field-work techniques, including quadrats and belt transects. They counted the plants and recorded the soil moisture and light intensity from the top of the Hanging Meadow down towards the waterline. The students were incredibly resilient as it rained the entire trip.



















Trinity Schools Book Awards

From October 2023 to February 2024, the library has promoted reading and reviewing the shortlisted books that make up the Trinity Schools Book Award (TSBA).

The TSBA was originally developed by and for librarians in the Trinity Group of schools (a loose association of independent schools in London and the South East), but any interested secondary school can join in.

The TSBA aims to celebrate quality writing in both new and older fiction on a different theme each year. The theme for 2024 was Elemental, with shortlisted books containing the theme of earth, air, fire and water. Students read the shortlisted books during the Autumn and Spring terms and cast their votes early in the new year to determine the winner of two awards.

The Trinity Award is awarded to those shortlisted books suitable for Years 6, 7 & 8 and The Trinity Plus Award, shortlisted books for the older Year 9+/ YA book category.

Both awards are judged by students casting online votes for their favourite book.

This year, the awards ceremony took place at Latymer Upper School in Hammersmith, who were celebrating their 400th anniversary. Thirty schools from across the south-east attended the awards ceremony in their theatre, with the awards ceremony also being live-streamed for those that could not attend in person.

Five short-listed authors attended the ceremony including Chloe Daykin, Frances Hardinge, Ann Sei Lin Natasha Bowen and Teri Terry. After the awards ceremony, we were invited to stay for some 'Elemental' themed snacks and to meet the authors for a book signing.

The competition gives students the opportunity to enter competitions either creative responses or book reviews to win prizes. Luella entered the creative response competition, and it was lovely to see her artwork on display at the awards ceremony.

The winner of the Trinity Award was Rebel Skies by Ann Sei Lin and the winner of the Trinity Plus Award was Lies Like Wildfire by Jennifer Lynn Alvarez.

"I really enjoyed the TSBA as they introduced me to many new authors and I liked all of the books in the competition. The award ceremony itself was really good and fun as well, and I enjoyed meeting the authors, my favourite author was Frances Hardinge" Luella

Year 8: Croydon Athletics Championships

Year 8 took part in the annual Croydon Athletics Championships this year and were represented by Ellie, Kemafo, Chloe, Tianna, Mya-Rose, Gracie-Mae, Lola, Akshita, Rishita, Elise and Liana.

Some highlights from the event: Tianna made it to the 100m final and narrowly missed out on a medal, Akshita won Bronze in the B string Javelin, Chloe won Bronze in the B String Discus. Kemafo was placed an impressive first in the A String Discus and Ellie took the silver medal in the 300m.

As a result, Ellie and Kemafo were both selected to represent North Croydon at the Surrey Schools Athletics Championships at Kingsmeadow Stadium. This is a huge achievement! Ellie produced a personal best performance of 46.25s in the 300m. Kemafo came 6th we think in the discus although we are still waiting for the official result. Well done to them both!

We have just had notification that Old Palace came SIXTH overall which is really impressive considering we only had a small team! This is Sixth out of all the schools entering a girls team in Croydon. Well done!

Science Week: Flashes and Bangs

During Science Week, the Chemistry Department once again put on a show of some exciting demonstrations that go beyond the curriculum for Years 8 and 9. The chemical reactions were based around the themes of combustion and redox.

We invited the students to write about their favourite reactions. Here's what they said:

I enjoyed all the demonstrations of 'Flashes and Bangs' a lot. My favourites were 'the methane rocket' where a rocket (plastic bottle) was filled with a methane oxygen mix and then lit on fire. It flew really fast across the room and hit the wall. My other favourite was where icing sugar was blown into a flame and created a fire ball. That was my favourite because it was an everyday item that can very quickly start a fire, teaching us to be careful with what we keep close to them!

I liked all the experiments, but my favourites would have to have been the whoosh bottle and the elephant toothpaste. The elephant toothpaste was a very rapid reaction as the iodide acts as a catalyst for the reaction. The whoosh bottle had propan-2-ol which caused it to combust and create a big flame and when it ignited it created the whoosh noise. They were both very interesting to watch.

My favourite experiment was the whoosh bottle. In this experiment, a small volume of alcohol was shaken inside an empty water cooler bottle. Most of the alcohol vapourised and the excess liquid was poured out. I held a splint at arm's length and ignited the vapour. A huge flame was to be seen alongside a whoosh sound.

Another experiment I enjoyed was the methane rocket launch. I found the rocket flying across the room to be really exciting, even though it made me jump! If it wasn't for the door it could have gone even further. The bottle consisted of a methane and oxygen mixture and the force that propelled the rocket came from the gases expanding - the reaction gave out energy which heated it. From these experiments, I learnt that methane and oxygen, or alcohol, can combust, releasing huge amounts of energy.

Lola-Marie wrote:

The methane rocket was my favourite as it was very exciting and memorable.

The equation for the reaction is

CH4(g) + 2O2(g)

CO2(g) + 2H2O(I)

The Canon Fire reaction also received four votes.

Senvri described the reaction:

My favourite experiment was the Canon Fire. It was a redox reaction where hydrogen peroxide was poured into an evaporating basin. Then some ethanol was poured on top and ignited. It burned quietly. Finally, some potassium manganate VII powder was sprinkled onto the burning mixture. It created loud popping sounds.



Five chose Dangerous Sugar.

Gracie-Mae explains why this was her favourite:

One of the best demonstrations I've seen by far! I never knew sugar could do that! The luminous colours that it made were really astonishing! A great experiment to watch. Thank you to all the Science team who prepared everything.

The demonstration that received the most votes, the favourite of eight of the students, was the Screaming Jelly Baby. Luella explains why she chose this one:

My favourite experiment was the Screaming Jelly Baby because I liked the light that it produced and the sound it made. It was very smoky, but it smelt like jam!

We loved this opportunity to demonstrate some awesome chemical reactions to our students and it was a delight to see their reactions.

Cat Milk

"I really enjoyed this experiment and finding out how to make cat milk. My favourite part was watching the clear balls form as they resembled orbeez. From this experiment, I learnt that lactase, which is an enzyme, breaks lactose into 2 sugars, glucose and galactose. I am curious to find out how we can make sure there is 0% lactose in the milk and what other methods we can use." **Shreya**, Year 9

"I learnt from the 'cat milk' practical that you can break down words like 'lactose' in order to find what they contain. Through this i learnt that when an item has an ending of '-ose' it contains sugar!" **Nailah-Belle**, Year 9

Science Week began with a Practical Problem-Solving challenge for everyone in Year 8. In the competition students worked in teams of four to solve an engineering task under a strict time limit.

All students participated well, collaborating effectively to design and construct structures that fulfilled the requirements. It was a close-run contest.



Liquid Nitrogen

Year 10 students witnessed a series of demonstrations with liquid nitrogen. As well as learning key facts, they were treated to the sight of a supercooled superconductor causing a magnet to levitate and spin, a Pringles can leaping into the air, materials change structure and size. A lucky few made ice-cream using liquid nitrogen in a separate session.

Some students commented:

"I liked watching how the light bulb without its casing was able to stay alight under liquid nitrogen. I found it interesting how something we use in our daily lives needs safety precautions to work at all (i.e. the inert gas in the normal bulb)." Rosie

"I enjoyed watching how the liquid nitrogen changed a banana from soft to so hard that it was solid enough to bang a mail like a hammer." **Amber** "An amazing experience, which I thoroughly enjoyed. It was surprising how cold the liquid nitrogen was. The experiments were really interesting, especially the ones with different materials including food." Jana

Here is some breaking news! Both Liana and Ayesha in Year 8 have got through to the final of the BAFTA Young Game Designers Competition 2024. This is particularly impressive, because every year thousands of students nationally enter this very rigorous and challenging competition, where the standards are incredibly high.

This now makes a grand total of 11 students who have got through to the BAFTA final from OP (for either games design or games making) in the last eight years - since we started

submitting entries. Both Liana and Ayesha got through to the final ten students for games design. Their game is called "Sunny Side" about a helpful duck. The graphics and design work for this are particularly impressive for their age range, and are very polished looking, as well as having real retro feel to them. The final is at BAFTA HQ in Piccadilly, is in early July.


